Successful HVAC Installation at the Omak School District

A year ago, the Omak School District evaluated our systems to identify the greatest needs within our facilities. Due to the age of our existing equipment, the availability and cost of replacement parts, coupled with our need to improve indoor air quality, the district had determined that upgrading our heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) systems throughout all of our buildings would provide the greatest benefit to our students, staff, and community. Most of the HVAC equipment was almost 40 years old, which means they had nearly doubled their estimated useful life. We are fortunate to have an outstanding maintenance crew that kept the equipment running for this long.

The Omak School Board decided that we should begin this project sooner than later, knowing that supply chain issues could be a concern. In November of 2021, the School Board approved moving forward with the HVAC project during the summer of 2022, partnering with MacDonald-Miller. Starting in December 2021, teams of engineers were sent to measure, design and order all of the necessary parts so that they would be ready to begin as soon as school was out. As a matter-of-fact, MacDonald-Miller sent teams who immediately began working with a sense of urgency in the evenings even before school was out.

Anybody who has worked on a large-scale project (such as building a house), knows how unlikely it is to complete a project on time. MacDonald-Miller has been true to their word to complete this project during the summer so that school could begin as planned on August 31st. They provided weekly project updates and brought in multiple crews, sometimes working 7 days a week. Even with hiccups, such as having some of their materials stolen, MacDonald-Miller stayed within their completion time-line. From Facilities Director Tim Engh:

Our HVAC contractor, MacDonald-Miller, has been hard at work updating the HVAC systems at North, East, Middle School and the B-Wing of the High School. They have replaced 140 Heat Pumps, 4 Fluid Coolers, 1 Boiler, and 9 Hydronic Loop Pumps, not to mention other items such as adding two large steel beams in OMS to support the weight of the new tower. This has been a huge undertaking in such a short time span. We will certainly appreciate the benefits of the upgrades for many years once they are complete.






I am very pleased to share that MacDonald-Miller has completed the project on time and on budget. The Omak School District was able to utilize our Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds without asking our community for any additional money. The new equipment has increased air flow capacity, allowing us to use higher rated filters that will capture more particulates and dispense cleaner air throughout our buildings, all while saving the Omak School District an estimated \$22,000 in annual energy costs.




